Way back last year, we began to work on a short, easy, practical definition of church life and discipleship, using the word SWEET as a way to remember the basics. You probably recall S for Service, W for Worship, E for Evangelism, and the second E that stands for Education. Now that we're past the stewardship season, Advent, and Christmas, let's wrap this up. The T in SWEET stands for... *Drumroll for the big finale, please!* T is for Togetherness!

Yes, you probably saw it coming. When Christ calls us, he calls us into a community. It's no coincidence that when he launched his public ministry, Jesus' first priority was putting together a group of committed folks—the disciples—as a community of faith, sharing, and support. If you think about it, you'll realize that the little band of disciples practiced the SWEET pattern in following Jesus. They SERVED through healings, feedings, blessings. They WORSHIPED together regularly. They practiced EVANGELISM, sharing the good news of the gospel and inviting people to meet Jesus. EDUCATION was clearly a priority as they learned continually from Jesus. And of course TOGETHERNESS was a hallmark of their shared discipleship.

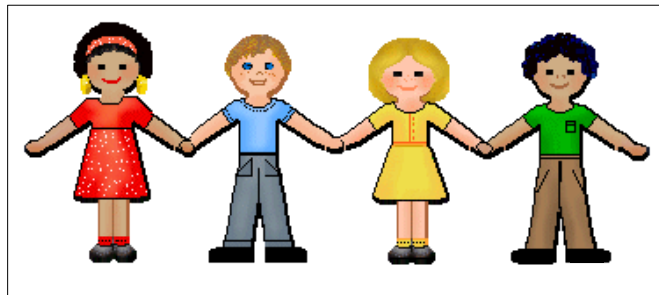
Togetherness may sound like the easiest thing on the SWEET list, but I don't think so. Real relationships require

real commitment. Healthy families don't just happen; they have to be nurtured. Are you part of a Sunday School class or a circle? Of course, learning happens there (E is for Education!) but fellowship also grows in those groups. Do you hang around for a while after worship on Sundays so you can spend time with your brothers and sisters (especially the newcomers)? Are you on the prayer chain? Are you serving on a committee? S is for Service, and working together is one of the surest ways to bond with others. Do you get in touch with members who are sick or in trouble? Do you notice when someone is missing and give them a call? Do you make church parties and fellowship events a priority or are you too busy to take part?

In some ways, T for Togetherness provides the cement that allows us to build with all the other letters of SWEET. Why would anyone want to be part of a church unless they felt loved and cherished in that congregation? An early believer named Tertullian was asked what made Christianity attractive to those outside the church. Tertullian answered that when pagans looked at Christians, they cried out "See how they love each other!" I hope that anyone who gets to know BAPC will say the same thing about us.

## **REMEMBERING...**

### **Edwin H. and Amie Greene**

There probably has been no greater admired administrator at Sycamore Schools than Edwin H. Greene. A 1927 graduate of Sycamore High School, Ed Greene was named the supervising principal of the district in 1951 and given the title of Superintendent when the local school district became a city school district in December 1961 with a salary of \$12,330 and a school budget of \$1.6 million. He and his wife Amie were longtime and active members of Blue Ash Presbyterian Church.

Montgomery and Blue Ash school boards in the 1920s agreed to build a joint high school, Sycamore High School, that opened in 1925 on Cooper Road (currently Sycamore Junior High) which served until the new high school building was constructed in 1974 on Cornell Road.

Mr. Greene was a 1933 graduate of Maryville College in Tennessee and taught at Weller School in 1934. He later earned a master's degree at the University of Cincinnati. Born in Clarksville, Ohio, he was the son of Joy Vance and Jay Murray Greene. The elder Mr. Greene was the farm manager of John J. Emery's Peterloon farm and the family lived on Montgomery Road during those years.

Mr. Greene recalled that he did some labor work on the Peterloon estate for Mr. Emery.

At Weller School he taught 8 grades with 33 students, tended the coal-burning stove and took care of the building. In 1937 he moved to Blue Ash Elementary School to teach 6th grade, and was named principal in 1938. He and Amie Murphy, whose family owned Murphy Florist on Kenwood Road in Blue Ash, were married in 1941. She had attended White Oak Elementary School and graduated from Lockland High School and Miami University. The Greens had four children. He was past president of the Hamilton County Teachers Association and the Valley Association of School Administrators and after retirement in 1974 taught classes at the University of Cincinnati and Wilmington College. He was also a member of the Board of the Sycamore Senior Center.

Craig Kennedy, another longtime BAPC member, served as a member of the Sycamore Board of Education and recalled for the 1992 *History of Blue Ash* his first meeting with Superintendent Ed Greene: "My recollection of Mr. Greene was some time in 1956 when I had decided to run for the Board of Education. In order to learn something about the district I made an appointment to see

Mr. Greene and with a bit of difficulty found him in his office in the basement of the Hazelwood School (an elementary school on Cornell Road no longer used). The office was small and most of the filing cabinets containing the district files were packed in some disarray along the basement wall. Far from being pretentious, I had a few reservations about the location of the CEO of the district.

I found Mr. Greene easy to talk to and he was willing to spend all the time necessary to acquaint me with some of the facts of the current operation. "While at the time it did not particularly represent my idea of a very efficient business operation, I learned down the years to appreciate some qualities which are more important. Having been with the system prior to the 1949 consolidation, Mr. Greene most literally knew every parent, teacher, and child in the district, knew the family conditions which might adversely affect a child's learning process.

"As the district expanded over the years, the increase in numbers made the continuing personal contact impossible, but he never lost his sincere manner, his hearty greeting, and his total dedication to education. He must have attended every function that ever took place, all the games, all the theatrical productions, all the band concerts - everything. As I look back he went far beyond the call of duty and in so doing, perhaps sacrificed a portion of his personal life.

"Mr. Greene initiated, before any other suburban district, a program for children with learning disabilities. For years the state did not provide funds for this effort and Mr. Greene wanted to keep these children in our district and proposed that we finance some separate classes for these children. Board members agreed and financed the program with local funds."

In a news article published in 1974 about Mr. Greene he commented about Sycamore and their achievements: "We were first to have classes for slow learners and one of the first to hire speech and hearing therapists; to have a perceptual motor program, to hire a fulltime psychologist, first among those to have a fully contained library in each school including elementary with a fulltime staff librarian which we now call Instructional Media Centers. He also noted "we established a vocational training department when I was principal at the high school and a great help to us has been the School Planning Commission where we can call upon the community to help solve our problems."

The late Mary Weber (Barbara Weber's aunt) wrote about Ed Greene in the January 1995 Tidings. She wrote that Ed came to Montgomery in 1927 when they were sophomores in high school. She also wrote "Ed's friends numbered in the hundreds and if you were included among those friends, you could consider yourself honored. I was one of those so honored. We have been friends for a long time."

David Innis recalled in that issue of Ed Greene policy on snow days, and he rarely called for a snow day telling people he would declare one if the snow reached his bedroom window sill. "We all know that Ed and Amie lived on Kenwood Road and their bedroom was on the second floor!," David wrote.

### **Edwin H. Greene School**

The "new" Sycamore Junior High School opened on Aldine Dr. in 1963. In 1974 the building was renamed the Edwin H. Greene Middle School when a grade reorganization took place and middle school for 5th and 6th graders was established. The school was then named honoring Mr. Greene who announced he would retire from the district. More than 400 residents, school officials and friends attended Edwin H. Greene Appreciation Day held on June 2, 1974, at which time the Greene school was named for him. An editorial in one of the local newspapers called him - Mr. Sycamore Joe Flege, a BAPC member (ck) came to the Sycamore School District as principal at Blue Ash Elementary School, then served as assistant superintendent to Mr.

Greene. He recalls Mr. Greene as the "ultimate as an administrator. He looked at children's educational needs to be of the highest quality. He was the first to establish program for kids with disabilities and concerned that the district develop the needed programs for their total education.

"Mr. Greene had a knack for coming up with programs that students needed and his strength was that once he had a good idea he was tenacious in following through with that idea for our kids. A modest man, he could have been king, but he would go down on the streets to help make Sycamore the best school district." Another BAPC member, Bob Schriever who taught for 27 years at Sycamore Junior High described Mr. Greene as a "straight shooter, one of the best, and I think he knew the name of each child in the school. I remember there was a custodian at one of the schools who died shortly after retiring and his wife was left with no pension. Mr. Greene went to Columbus and returned with a pension for the wife."

Nancy Hannel who was at Sycamore High School when Mr. Greene was the principal recalls that he taught Sunday School at BAPC. She found Mr. Greene very approachable and remembered that he helped negotiate a land swap with the City of Blue Ash for the present site of the BAPC building.

Mr. Greene joined BAPC in 1942 and was a member until his death in 1994. He held the office of elder, served as chairman of many committees, and sang in the choir. He was member of Masonic Lodge No. 94 and the Blue Ash Lions Club.

Amie Greene joined BAPC in 1936 and was a member until her death in 2004. Betty Greer recalled Amie as "someone you would call a lady.

She was a very sweet and quiet person, attended circle meetings." Betty also remembered that Amie often gave a small gift to someone going to the hospital or who were ill. And recalled they both were quite active in T.W.O.

Both Greene's were well named: **they were gardeners.**

**Presentation of 2012 Operating Budget:**

The 2012 Operating Budget was presented by the Moderator.

**MOTION PREVAILED** to receive the 2012 Adopted Budget

Bob Van Stone, member of the Stewardship Committee, and Treasurer Joy D’Andrea stepped forward to answer questions relating to the 2012 Budget and the decrease of approximately \$33,500 in anticipated pledge income for 2012.

Question: Were there cuts to the budget other than to the Mission allocation?

Response: There were cuts made in every area possible. The average cut to program costs was approximately 67%. However, because certain costs are fixed—i.e. utilities, mortgage, etc., certain programs had to be cut more than the average 67%.

Question: Was the reduction in pledge income attributed to fewer pledges or lower amounts pledged?

Response: The number of pledges was lower primarily because of deaths of members and the lack of prepaid pledges carried forward from prior years. Amounts of individual pledges decreased as well.

Other questions were raised re use of the Kroger card, members covering cost of their Presbytery per capita assessment, etc. These matters were referred to the Stewardship committee who will conduct an in-depth study in an effort to find ways to cut expenses and increase revenue wherever possible.


Diane McKinnon agreed to serve as our Elder Commission to Presbytery for 2012, and Christine Driscoll will serve as her alternate.

## Plans for Mission Outreach in 2012

Several important events are brewing to enable faithful outreach and partnership to continue this year. We are bringing back *Trivia Night* and the Silent Auction for the *Intergenerational Dance*—as well as institution of “Fifth Sundays” with Mission-focused activities. As you may have heard, results of the recent Stewardship campaign did not meet the challenge budget, which cut funding in that budget for most committees by about two-thirds. While this sounds startling, we’ve already set in motion both Mission fund-raising and priorities for spending that will let us honor our recent commitments (e.g., the auxiliary nurse in HAS Haiti arranged by Dawn Johnson) and continue support to our major partnerships (e.g., N.E.E.D.S.).

*Please join us in the following activities as you are able:*

- Sunday, January 29th—Formal initiation of sponsorships for the Uraa scholarship program (See details below)
- Tuesday, February 7th—Next meeting of the Mission Committee (where you can help plan the following events) at the Popenoes’ home, 7:30 p. m.
- Sunday, March 18th—Intergenerational Dance (sponsored by Christian Education) that includes a silent auction that will generate funds for our major outreach programs.
- Sunday, April 29th—Mission-focused liturgy (sponsored by Worship Committee) that includes a focus on our partner organization N.E.E.D.S.
- Fifth Sundays in July, September, and December—Additional Mission-related programs that we are developing over the coming months
- Saturday, October 13th (tentative date)—Trivia Night that builds on the successful event in 2010 and generates additional funds to close the budget gap in our programs.

In addition to requiring work to raise funds, the budget gap requires us to prioritize our partnerships more than in 2011. To this end, we will first seek to meet our commitments to individuals made in 2011 (HAS auxiliary nurse; Uraa scholarships). Secondly, we will maintain gifts to outside partners we have supported continuously for years (N.E.E.D.S., Bethany House, and Frances Newton Hospital). Although we may not have sufficient funds to direct part of our budget to PCUSA work directly, we will continue to receive special offerings (e.g., *One Great Hour of Sharing*) that support work of Presbyterian Church, USA.

# URAA SCHOOL PROJECT

As reported previously (Tidings, October 2011), we continue to support the scholarship program in Tanzania. We've committed to provide the secondary school fees, uniforms, and supplies for now nineteen students from Shari village (most are in this 2011 photo). Each of these students is orphaned—in most cases due to parents who died from AIDS. Last year, before we provided funds, schools sent home many of the students for their failure to pay fees.



To keep this program alive, we are inviting families, individuals, and BAPC groups (as well as any outside organization you may convince to join our effort) to sponsor one or more students. The cost to sponsor each student the entire 2012 school *year* is either \$110 or \$140 (depending on year in school). On January 29th after worship, we'll have profiles of all nineteen students, including name, a photo, and year in school; you can then select any available student and take home a copy of her/his profile.

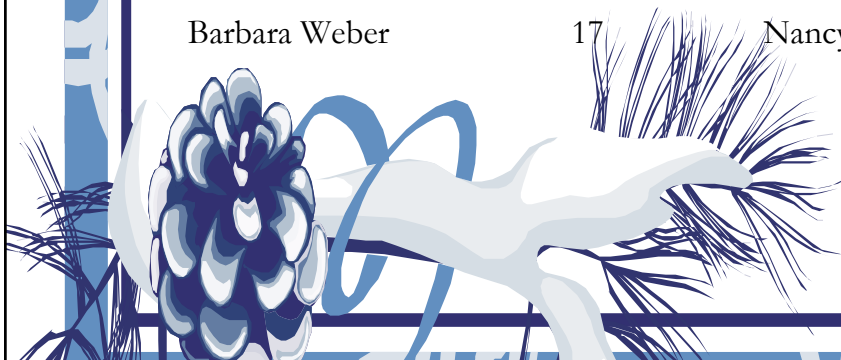
